Welcome to the Fall 2021 Sauk River Chain of Lakes (SRCL) Association Newsletter. As I write this article, it is a beautiful 81-degree sunny September 30th day. Hopefully, you enjoyed this past Summer as I did - experiencing all the beauty of the Chain of Lakes.

This year marked a significant number of accomplishments for our SRCL Association:

1. We created a new logo for the SRCL and created a clothing line with our logo.

2. We spent a record amount of money fighting aquatic invasive species, specifically curly-leaf pondweed (CLP).

3. We hired a company to mechanically harvest CLP. Something we talked about for four years!

4. We had a record number of members and amount of money received in dues.

5. We received a record amount of money running the gambling operations at Shady's Longshots!

6. We purchased and deployed 15 haz-

ard buoys to mark rocks and hazard areas across the Chain.

7. We added an Internet Landing Installed Device Sensor (ILIDS) at the Long Lake public access to improve boater education.

8. We awarded a land use grant to a homeowner for improving their property to protect runoff into the lake.

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Aquatic Invasive Species Management

We would like to address any confusion that may have resulted from the Sauk River Chain of Lakes Association's (SRCLA) management of the aquatic invasive species called curly leaf pondweed (CLP) in the Chain of Lakes. The SRCL fielded a number of communications from property owners that had misunderstandings. Hopefully, they can be addressed here.

The DNR limits what lakes we can treat and the amount of the areas we can treat. For example, we wanted to do a treatment on Zumwalde Lake, but our permit was denied. In addition, we can only chemically treat a maximum of 15 percent of CLPinfested littoral acres. So, if a lake has 100 acres of CLP, we can only treat 15 acres.

The SRCLA does not treat CLP in front of individual properties. We are charged with managing CLP in the entire Chain of Lakes. Please manage your frontage and use the information at srcl.org to help. With the combined effort of the SRCLA doing navigational routes and individual

properties owners doing their frontage, we can get in front of CLP!

Because of CLP's prevalence in the entire Chain of Lakes and cost of over \$700 per acre to treat, the SRCLA simply does not have the financial resources to treat it all. However, we can be strategic in our approach, and the Board of the SRCLA weighs multiple variables in deciding which areas to treat.

When doing treatments, the SRCLA only treats CLP and not native plants or algae. Please be aware, chemical and mechanical treatments are a temporary fix. To really address excessive aquatic plant growth, we need to reduce the nutrients in the Chain. Please consider refraining from fertilizing your lawns. The majority of your fertilizer ends up in the Chain!

The SRCLA is thankful for the nonprofit gambling funds generated at Shady's Longshots! The SRCLA spent over \$50,000 to chemically and mechanically treat over 70 acres of CLP. This is the most

ever spent!

Details of the treatments can be found at srcl.org. The SRCLA thanks Limnopro and Weeds Up for their work!

In addition, the SRCLA did aquatic plant surveys before and after treatments and will continue to use best management practices in trying to minimize the impact of CLP. In addition, the SRCLA is continuously monitoring the advancements to manage zebra mussels and surveying for any other invasives (i.e. starry stonewort) to prevent infestations.

Please remember to Clean, Drain, and Dry all your equipment when entering or exiting the water. If you purchase a dock or lift that is coming from another body of water, remember that it is required to have that equipment sit on land for at least 21 days. 



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AIS Transport Prevention Using I-LIDS

Managing the problem of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) in the Sauk River Chain of Lakes requires a multipronged approach of measurement, control, and prevention.

As part of our preventive strategy, the Board has partnered with a Minnesota company Environmental Sentry Protection, LLC to purchase, install and manage a network of its Internet Landing Installed Device Sensors (I-LIDS) at the four public access points on the Chain; Highway 23, Highway 22, Highway 71, and Long Lake. The I-LIDS is designed to increase the boater's awareness of the need to prevent the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS).

When a boater is detected, I-LIDS plays multiple educational messages and triggers the camera to capture and transmit high-resolution videos of the boat's condition over the Internet to a remote server. There the videos are reviewed by trained personnel as part of an ongoing service provided by Environmental Sentry Protection. Videos are reviewed for compliance with State Law relating to the transfer of aquatic plants on the boater's equipment. Videos of potential violations are further reviewed and posted on a secure website where we can review the videos for confirmation.

The SRCL board has established a collaborative agreement with the Stearns County Sheriff's office to investigate AIS violations and issue a

warning or citation to the boater.

Statistics for the I-LIDS operation at the access points on the chain for the timeframe May through August are as follows:

Highway 23 access point: 2735 raw videos generated, 1474 videos of interest reviewed, 0 potential violations identified.

Highway 22 access point: 15333 raw videos generated, 2061 videos of interest reviewed, 7 potential violations identified.

Highway 71 access point: 8071 raw videos generated, 2080 videos of interest reviewed, 0 potential violations identified.

Long Lake access point: 8753 raw videos generated, 2020 videos of interest reviewed, 0 potential violations identified.

The Board believes that the presence of the I-LIDS at our access points emphasizes the importance of proper cleaning and inspection procedures needed to ensure the AIS-safe launch and retrieval. From the data above, we note a low number of violations indicating that there is a consistent effort to Clean-Drain-Dry. We are always looking for new ideas to promote awareness of AIS transfer. Water Quality

Hello Everyone, I am Aaron Schwartz, the chair of the water quality committee. I joined the board in the spring of 2020. I have lived on Koetter Lake for the past four years, with my wife, Krysten, and our two daughters, Addison (7) and Emilia (3), and our dog Rem. I jumped at the opportunity to join the board as I wanted to get involved in the preservation of this great water system for our children and their children.

For those that are new to the Sauk River Chain of Lakes (SRCL) Association, I wanted to take a moment to break down the role and responsibilities of the Water Quality Committee. My role is two pronged, the first is to oversee the water sampling and data collection for the water quality of our system, the second is to coordinate the Adopt-A-Highway program that we as an association sponsor.

Water Sampling

As mentioned above, my role on the board is to oversee the water sampling that occurs across our water system. We take water samples from six of the lakes on the Horseshoe Chain of Lakes. Those lakes are a mix of both flowage and non-flowage lakes, they include, Horseshoe, Cedar Island, Zumwalde, Schneider, Krays, and Knaus. Once each month from May through September, we head out to designated locations in each of these lakes to perform the following:

take two water samples from a depth of 4-6 ft, take a water clarity reading with a Secchi disk, and fill out a general survey of the weather conditions and water appearance. We as an Association have continued our partnership with the Sauk River Watershed District (https://srwdmn.org/) for the processing and analysis of the water samples and the Secchi disk reading data and add them to our ongoing historic data set. The SRWD will then submit back to us the year's results via a report. This report is typically delivered around the beginning of the year. The 2020 result are currently available on the SRCL website (www.srcl.org) for those that wish to review. The are three main data point that we monitor are Total Phosphorus (read nutrients), Chlorophyll-a (read green color), and clarity depth.

Road Clean-Up

The other role of the Water Quality Chairman is coordinating the road cleanup of our Adopt-a-Highway stretch of Hwy 22. The association has expanded those efforts beyond the two-mile stretch of road to include the public access on Hwy 22 as well as the bridge area on County Road 71 and the public access and fishing area on also on Co Rd 71. Our responsibility for the Adopt-a-Highway is to pick up litter two times a year which we typically try to complete the first week of May and the first week of October. We ask for 12-18 volunteers to make this process go quickly. I am so thankful for all the volunteers that take time out of their busy schedules to help prevent this road trash from entering our water system. Like most things, many hands have made for light work. Over the last three events that I was a part of, we have removed on average 18 bags of trash within an hour or so of work. Again, thank you to everyone that has volunteered their time.

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Financial Report

The balance sheet for the Sauk River Chain of Lakes (SRCL) Association continues to remain strong. The SRCL has total checking and savings in excess of \$61,000. Added to these are our certificates of deposit amounting to nearly \$28,000. This gives us total assets of \$89,000.

The assets remain strong because of three major factors; your contributions to membership, the strong contributions we are receiving from our gambling operations (\$30,000 over the last three months), and nearly \$8,000 in grants from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources and Stearns County to help control aquatic invasive species. As we discussed in the annual meeting this year, we have made significant strategic expenditures in the following areas:

1. Aquatic invasive species. We have spent over \$25,000 in chemical treatments and \$24,000 in mechanical treatments of the invasive species curly leaf pondweed. We spent \$6,500 in plant surveys before and after the treatments to measure the effectiveness and to determine if there were other infestations of invasive species.

2. Internet Landing Installed Device Sensors (ILIDS). To help monitor and prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species, we invested over \$17,000 in upgrades, operational costs and the purchase of an ILIDS for the Long Lake public access.

3. Buoy purchases. To help boaters navigate through and around underwater hazards, we spent over \$4,000 to buy buoys and materials which were placed in strategic locations on the Chain.

4. Land use and water quality. We continue to ensure that we help maintain proper land-use and ensure water quality by monitoring our water in conjunction with the Sauk River Water District. We spent over \$7500 in these areas.

When you add it all up, we have invested over \$84,000 to help create a better experience on the Chain. We are positioned to invest even more next year.

Rock Buoys Added to the Chain in 2021-

This year the SRCLA was able to purchase and put out on the Chain 15 buoys to mark rocks. We hired the Stearns County Water Patrol to put them in and take them out as they have the proper equipment for handling these buoys. The Water Patrol just took out the buoys on Sunday, September 19th, and they held up well, so we are able to reuse them all next year. They did need a deep cleaning as they were rather scummy and were covered in Zebra Mussels- some worse than others, but we hope they were a great addition to the lakes and your boating experience this year.

Land Use Grants Available -

We started a new grant program this year to help landowners to reduce or eliminate runoff into the lake from their properties. We are striving to do this by adding native grasses and buffers between your yard and the lake to reduce the chemicals and fertilizers in our yards from getting into the lake. We did have some interest in the program, and I had discussions with a few homeowners. We did have one grant that was approved for this year, but with the dry summer the project was delayed so, we will pay that out next year once they get the work finished. We will include some pictures and details of the project on our website when we are able to get it.



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Fisheries Report

We are excited about the state of our fishery here on the Sauk River Chain of Lakes. We have been working closely with our local Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (MN DNR) representative Joe Stewig to ensure our fishery remains healthy. Joe and his team continue to partner with us through lake surveys, electro studies, and limit adjustments. We are in our first year of the new bluegill 10 fish daily limit, and the feedback has been very positive. We will continue to work with Joe and his team to make sure that the Sauk River Chain of Lakes remains the best fishery in Stearns County. Below is a detailed look at what the MN DNR has done throughout 2021 here on the chain.


Sauk River Chain of Lakes (SRCL)

2021 Lake Survey Summary

In 2021, Sauk Rapids Area Fisheries staff conducted lake surveys throughout the SRCL. Sampling consisted of spring targeted Bluegill/Black Crappie surveys on Horseshoe and Cedar Island Lakes and summer gill nets (all lakes). The Sauk River Chain of Lakes are surveyed every three years with gill nets and every six years with trap nets and bass electrofishing. This year was gill nets only and in 2024 the survey will consist of gill nets, trap nets and bass electrofishing. Spring targeted Bluegill/Black Crappie assessments will be conducted every four to five years, and Young-of-the-Year (YOY) Walleye are sampled annually in October.

A spring targeted Bluegill assessment was conducted on Horseshoe and Cedar Island Lakes from May 19 – 21, 2021 once water surface temperatures reached 60 F. Spring targeted Bluegill surveys tend to be better representative of the overall size structure as opposed to summer trap net assessments. Sixteen trap nets were set into each lake and checked daily. A total of 548 Bluegills were sampled from the two lakes and ranged in length from 3.5 - 10inches with an average length of 7.7 inch-



es. Ninety-eight percent of the Bluegills caught were longer than six (6) inches and 43 percent were longer than eight (8) inches!!! The Bluegill population remains healthy in the SRCL.

Black Crappie continue to do well in the Chain even though their numbers have dropped significantly from what they were in the 1980s and 90s. Spring sampling was conducted simultaneously with the Bluegill sampling in 2021 and sampled 346 crappies. Crappies ranged in length from five (5) - 13 inches with an average length of 9.3 inches. Ninety-one percent of the crappies sampled were longer than


eight (8) and 30 percent were longer than ten (10) inches. Most of the fish were between eight (8) and nine (9) inches and should provide good fishing over the next few years.



Largemouth and Smallmouth Bass were not sampled in 2021 but will be sampled again in 2024. With that in mind here is a summary from the 2018 spring bass electrofishing. Two hundred and forty-two Largemouth Bass were sampled in 2018 and ranged in length from six (6) – 20 inches with an average length of 11.6 inches. Forty-two percent of the catch were longer than 12 inches and 21 percent were longer than 15 inches. While not as numerous, we did sample 116 Smallmouth Bass mostly out of Horseshoe and Cedar Island lakes. Smallmouth Bass also ranged in length from six (6) - 20 inches with an average length of 13.6 inches. five percent were longer than 11 inches and 52 percent were longer than 14 inches. The SRCL is a destination lake for Largemouth and Smallmouth Bass anglers judging by the number of permitted bass tournaments that are held there each year.



Channel Catfish abundance continues to decrease with a decreasing trend over the last three surveys. The catch in 2021 (12.3/gill net) was the lowest since 2003; however, the average size has increased.

Four hundred and thirty-two catfish were

caught in 2021 ranging in length from nine (9) - 29.1 inches with an average size of 21 inches and three (3) pounds compared to 20 inches and 2.7 pounds in 2018. Catfishing continues to be terrific on the Chain during both the summer and

winter months, and the local conservation officer has mentioned that he is seeing many anglers taking advantage of the increased bag limit that was put in place in 2015.

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



Figure 5. Historical gill net catch rates of Channel Catfish (lakes combined) for the Sauk River Chain of Lakes (1995 – 2021).

Northern Pike have never been overabundant in the SRCL with catches ranging from 2.7 - 7.0/gill net. The catch in 2021 (4.9/gill net) was lower than 2018 (7.0/gill net), but still within the range of expected values for the lake class. One hundred sixty-two pike were sampled in 2021 and ranged in



length from 15 - 34 inches with an average length and weight of 21.5 inches and 2.1 pounds. Sixty-three percent of the pike caught were smaller than 22 inches while nine percent were longer than 26 inches and three percent were longer than 30 inches.

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
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The Walleye population in the SRCL had been sustained through fry stocking Horseshoe (275,000 – 675,000 fry) and Cedar Island (755,000 – 1,355,000 fry) Lakes since 2001 and prior to that through fingerling stocking. The SRCL Association has also done some supplemental stocking as well (100,000 fry each year we stock). However, in 2015 during a routine fall young-of-year (YOY)

Walleye assessment, we noticed some Walleye that were too big (nine (9) - 11 inches) to be YOY. Upon ageing a sub-sample of these fish, we verified that they were from the 2014year class a year in which we did not stock Walleye. We have always

assumed that some natural reproduction of Walleye was occurring within the Chain, but to what extent was unknown. After 2015, we started conducting annual fall YOY Walleve assessments in order to document natural reproduction. Since 2015, we have documented excellent natural reproduction in 2016 (107 YOY/hr), 2018 (149 YOY/hr), 2019 (120 YOY/hr) and to a lesser degree 2020 (74 YOY/hr) many of these catches rival the catches during stocked years. For perspective, we consider anything between 25 and 50 YOY/hr to be successful. Another interesting thing we observed during the 2018 gill net survey was that 52 percent of the Walleye sampled were produced during non-




Figure 9. Historical gill net catch rates of Walleye (lakes combined) for the Sauk River Chain of Lakes (1995 - 2021). Dashed lines indicate the upper and lower level of what we would expect to see for lakes similar to the Sauk Chain.

To build on what we've observed during our fall YOY Walleye shocking (2015 - present) and our 2018 and 2021 gill net surveys, we have put a hold on all Walleye stocking and have ramped up our sampling effort on the SRCL to every three years to better monitor Walleye recruitment. We also will continue to monitor Walleye natural reproduction through annual fall electrofishing and plan any future stocking accordingly. Stocking is not off the table, but naturally reproduced fish typically have a genetic advantage over stocked fish. Therefore, if we get two (2) consecutive years where we collect < 25 YOY/hr during fall electrofishing then we will fry stock the following year.

The SRCL was designated for

Muskellunge Management in 2011 and in May 2011, 132 adult Muskies were stocked into Cedar Island Lake in order to jump start the population. We followed that up with 1,030 fingerling (nine (9) - 14 inches) stocked in October 2011. Since then, 1,030 Muskellunge fingerlings are stocked every other year. In 2013, we started tagging the fingerling Muskies with passive integrated transponder (PIT) tags in order to monitor growth information over time. As far as population assessments go, Muskellunge generally take six to seven years to recruit to our sampling gear so our first attempt to assess the Muskie population will not likely take place until 2025. Even then we would only have approximately 5,000 fish roaming the SRCL that is




Figure 10. Length frequency of Walleye collected during the 2021 gill net survey.




